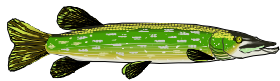
We Will Miss

Pike Marsh Report Spring, 2003

On April 3rd I opened the marsh. The lake was still frozen. At that time the water ran out for two or three days. Then it began to snow and the temperature fell into the low thirties. It continued to snow for three days. The snow was so deep that I had to leave the marsh open until April 10th. I closed it on the tenth and reopened it again on April 14th. On that day Pike began entering the marsh. I closed the marsh again on April 16th after counting about 30 large Pike inside. On April 18th I closed the north end of the marsh and on the 22nd I let the big Pike out. On that day the water in the marsh was very high so I needed to let it run out all day. I closed it again on the morning of April 23rd. The marsh was closed until May 24th when I began to let the fry out. I netted and released fry into Douglas Lake for the next three days. By May 27th the water in the marsh was too low to net any more fry. All in all we had a good hatch this year. It was not our best year but it was a good one.

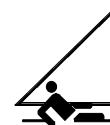
