Welcome to another summer on our favorite place, Douglas Lake. The lake is the lowest it has been this early in several years, it looks more like early August than June. Winter storms stayed south of us and after a big snow in December there was very little snowfall and not enough spring rains. One of the concerns of boat owners has been the ramp at the Douglas Lake Bar, some folks already having some problems getting their boats in. However, the DNR has already been out a couple of times to dredge and seem to be aware of the problems here. We will continue to monitor the situation and continue to be in contact with the DNR.

The results from those of you who responded to the Swimmers Itch Survey in our newsletter are being compiled. We will have all of the results to share in the next newsletter in July. One encouraging thing I have noticed is that there seem to be fewer Common Merganzers on the lake this year, I haven't seen any "families" yet. That would have a positiver effect on Swimmers Itch incidence according to the information we have learned in previous studies.

Ruby Nell Gardner
Born: Feb 221918 Died May 82010

Ruby Nell Gardner of 131 Mariomi Rd, New Canaan, CT passed away Saturday May 8th, in Norwalk Hospital.

Born In Brownfield TX to Effie Mae and Jessie Seaborn Smith Ruby Nell spent her first years as a farm girl in Brownfield attending local schools and helping her parents and siblings run the family cotton farm. After high school, she attended Texas Tech University, where she was a sorority member (Pi Beta Phi?) graduating in 1941 with a bachelors degree in Journalism. She the went to work as
a reporter for several local newspapers before deciding on a teaching career. During the first years of WWII, there were a number of Army bases established in that area of Texas. While Ruby Nell was teaching and coaching Little League, she met Roger Wheaton Clapp, an Army officer stationed at one of those bases and it wasn't long before they were married. The couple moved to Roger's hometown of Baltimore MD before Roger was deployed to the Middle East (sound familiar?). Ruby Nell continued her teaching career at the Gilman Country Day School where she taught the fifth form for over 10 years. Sadly, two yrs after WWII, Roger succumbed to Cancer in December 1947. As a young widow, Ruby Nell attended the First Presbyterian Church of Baltimore where the rector, Dr J.H. Gardner Jr introduced her to his youngest son, Ed, recently divorced, and relocated back east. After a courtship of several years, the couple were married in Jan 1951, living initially in Brooklyn Heights, NY. Their first son was born there before they moved to Tenafly NJ where son number 2 was born. After a move to Berwyn PA for several yrs
the Gardner family moved to New Canaan in 1958. Ruby Nell became a member of the Junior League during those first yrs in New Canaan where she formed friendships that lasted many decades. She was also a member of the Garden Club of New Canaan for a time and a tireless volunteer for the American Cancer Society where with the help of many volunteers from this area, formed an annual Spring Tea Dance at CCNC. The Tea Dances raised almost a \$M over 4 decades. Ruby Nell was also a Real Estate Broker in New Canaan for many yrs, first associated with the Ross Agency on Elm St and then w/ Sisson Real Estate. At different stages of her life she was a member of the New Canaan Field Club, Silver Spring Club, and CCNC. Newspaper Reporter, Teacher, Real Estate Broker, Volunteer, superb cook and charming hostess, avid bridge player, homemaker extraordinaire, devoted wife, Mom, and friend were just some of her many roles. Known as a strong and unique personality she took special care to maintain lifelong friendships. She was a master story teller who kept friends and strangers entertained for hours with her spins from the different areas she lived or visited. She also loved the natural beauty of New Canaan and CT and knew this was a special place to live. Preceded in death by her husband, Edward Pence Gardner and her son Edward Pence Gardner Jr, she is survived by her son, John H. Gardner II of 131 Mariomi Rd New Canaan.
