Dear Friends and Neighbors

Summer 2011 is well underway and judging by the numbers of boats and kayaks on the lake it is going well.

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Enjoy reading as we begin a series and discover the naming of some of our past and present local towns or villages.

Every hear of Buckhorn? In the late 1800's the community of Buckhorn was granted a post office. Stillman Wixson, a local hotelman, was the postmaster during its eight year existence, 1885 to 1893. Located in Monroe Township Buckhorn no longer exists though its name was revived with a maple syrup produced at the MacArthur Farm just off the Levering Cheboygan Road during the 1980's and 1990's.

The town of Levering in Emmet county was founded in 1882. This village, in then Egleston Township, began as a way station on the Grand Rapids & Indiana Railroad. First named Leverington, after Joshua Levering, the name was shortened to Levering when it's post office opened on Feb. 15, 1883.

Pellston's origins can be traced to William H. Pells, a native of Poughkeepsie, NY, who came to Michigan via Illinois where he purchased 1300 acres in Emmet County. In 1876 he built a store and a hotel and sold part of his land to settlers. The village, while not incorporated until 1907, was platted in 1882 and on September 20th named for Mr. Pells. The same year it was given a station on the Grand Rapids and Indiana Railroad and granted a Post Office with Henry Park as the first postmaster.

We Will Miss

We offer our condolences to the families of Bob Acton, Karen Hartwig, Jacob Hess and Tom Orlow.

Robert William Acton, Born July 9, 1924 died April 26, 2011. Bob, a former Douglas Lake resident was zone representative in the late 1970's and 1980's who valued his fishing on the lake both in summer and winter. He is survived by his wife Marge, three children and two grandchildren. As a boy he joined the Boy Scouts of America and kept in touch with his troop all of his life. Robert graduated from Jackson High School, Duke University and Michigan State University. He served his country in the Marines and the United States Navy as a Pharmacist Mate in the South Pacific. A much beloved Veterinarian in Jackson for 40 years, he was a member of the Mid-State Veterinary Association, on the board of directors for the Michigan State Veterinary Association, lifetime member of the American Veterinary Association and co-founder of the Jackson Veterinary Association. Many lake residents will remember the table discussions and debates of economics and politics with family and friends and he will always be remembered for lighting up a room with his personality, for his love of a good meal and giving everyone a hearty laugh. Let us use the words in farwell that Bob himself so often used in saying good bye, "Thanks a Million."

Karen Hartwig, Karen died unexpectedly on March 18, 2011. She was born on March 4, 1963 to Joan (Hock) and William Hartwig. She attended Red Cedar Grade School, Hannah Middle School, and graduated East Lansing High School in 1981. While in Middle School and High School she was a talented musician playing the clarinet and oboe in the concert and marching bands. She also participated on the track team. After graduation from Lansing Community College, she enjoyed a summer of study at the University of London, graduated from Michigan State University in 1995, and was a member of Phi Beta Delta (Honor Society for International Scholars). She was a loyal Spartan, always wearing her "lucky clothes" for games in anticipation of helping the teams win. She was employed at Sparrow Hospital, many years

at Lansing Community College, and more recently at Sam's Club. She was also a past board member of both Suits And The City and Michigan Pride, Inc. As one of her friends indicated, "You always had a big smile to share, a hug to give, a contagious laugh, and kind words to encourage and inspire. You were a straight shooter with tact and respect and a heart of gold." Karen enjoyed outdoor activities especially downhill skiing, water skiing, kayaking, biking, and playing with her dogs. A favorite activity was sail boating on Little Traverse Bay. Many happy hours were spent at the family cottage at Douglas Lake, Michigan - her "thin place." Karen's leaving is mourned by her parents, her sister Susan Hartwig (David Senner); her niece and goddaughter, Emma Senner; her partner Sarah Hinton; her godmother Kathy (Aunt Kathë) (Dennis) Buchweitz, and many other dear aunts, uncles, cousins, and friends; and her beloved dogs, Huck and Dockett. She left us on the eve of the lunar perigee (super moon), and has joined her maternal grandparents, Elfrieda (Riske) and Theodore Hock, and her paternal grandparents, Lillian (Hartka) and William Hartwig, in the heavens above.

Jacob C. Hess, It was August, 1947, when Jacob Hess from Wauseon, Ohio, having no idea what to expect, drove his family of five down a gravel road to a cabin he'd rented "sight-unseen" at Timber Lane on Douglas Lake. Timber Lane, at that time owned by a friendly, hard-working couple, Rollie and Helen Krueger, was a group of cabins (still there today) near the Douglas Lake Bar (today "Steakhouse") and north of Ma and Pa Fry's General Store (no longer in existence). That first trip sixty-four years ago sparked the beginning of a long and endearing relationship between the Hesses and Douglas Lake that has been passed on through the next three generations. On June 24, 2010, after living a full and independent life, Jake Hess died at age ninety-six. For decades, the Hess family spent the first two weeks of August with the friends they met from Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio who kept returning each year to Timber Lane. There were picnics at "the ravine"; Indian "pow-wows" and campfires on the beach; swimming, fishing, and row boating on the lake; and "kick the can" games around the cabins for the kids every night. The fun continued at Timber Lane until 1971, when Jake and his wife, Pearl, were able to fulfill a dream and purchase their own cabin from Ted Lile at

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11190 Douglas Lake Road. There the traditions continue as the children, grandchildren, and now even great-grandchildren make their memories at Douglas Lake.

Jake is remembered as a kind, patient, civic-minded fellow, philanthropic citizen and church leader who was an entrepreneur and businessman. He owned and operated the Hess Hatchery for thirty years and the J & B Feed Company for seven years, both in Wauseon. Pearl preceded Jake in death in 2002. They are survived by their three children, son Allan and daughter Jayne (Dennis) Morse of Toledo, Ohio; son John of Alice Springs, Northern Territory, Australia; eight grandchildren; and nine great-grandchildren.

I homas Leslie Orlow, 68, of Douglas Lake, Mich., died peacefully surrounded by family on July 21, 2011, in Petoskey, following a major stroke. He grew up in a bilingual household in Kettering, Ohio, the son of Alfred and Hanna Orlow, who were German immigrants. He attended Howe Military School, received his bachelor's degree from DePauw University and his master's degree in education from Miami University. He was a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. In the early 1960's he met his future wife, Linda Garmhausen, at Camp Chick-A-Mi, Linda's mother's private girls' camp near Douglas Lake, where he taught sailing, and she taught horseback riding. They married in 1966 in Sidney, Ohio, and have one daughter, Tammy Orlow. Tom was greatly influenced and inspired (academically and as fellow sailors) by Linda's father, Jack Garmhausen. Tom was an engineering officer in the Navy where he served for 2 1/2 years. Following his service, he taught social studies at Talawanda High School in Oxford, Ohio, for nearly 30 years. At Talawanda, he founded the Service Learning program and the Sailing Club. In Oxford, he was involved with Miami Ice Hockey, volunteered at the Community Counseling & Crisis Center Hotline, and was a member of the United Methodist Church and the Lions Club.

Tom and Linda retired to the north shore of Douglas Lake in 1999. Even in retirement, Tom could not stay away from teaching. In Petoskey, he taught social sciences at North Central Michigan College. He was program director for the Lake Charlevoix Mariners sailing school for five years. He took over as program director for the Little Traverse Sailors sailing school in Harbor Springs in 2005. He also taught U.S. Sailing Instructor Training Courses throughout the region. In Northern Michigan, he was a member of US SAILING, Charlevoix Yacht Club, Little Traverse Yacht Club, and was on the board of the Michigan School of Marine Technology.

Tom, a gifted, passionate teacher, and an avid reader he also enjoyed rowing, weight lifting, and listening to music. He had a strong desire to pass his love and knowledge of sailing on to others. He particularly enjoyed the thrill and camaraderie of competitive sailing, and raced his boat Northern Light in Chicago Mackinac races, and as many Charlevoix Wednesday night races as possible. Tom has inspired and mentored countless sailors of all ages. Our Douglas Lake community misses him.

A Eurasian Water Milfoil Task Force led by Peter Klaas is already at work. Their mission is to learn whether or not we have this invasive in the lake. So far there is no evidence of it but the other part of the mission is to prepare a Plan of Action so that if a problem is identified we will be ready to act. Problems in other northern Michigan lakes have caused us to prepare "just in case".
